# What you need:

- >Embroidery Hoop 15cm
- >White fabric or fabric of your choice
- >Needle one with a larger eye hole will be easier to thread your needle
- >Pencil or Disappearing Marker
- >The Pattern
- >Scissors
- >Embroidery Floss
- >Eraser if you are using a pencil
- >OPTIONAL fabric glue, backing fabric

### **Embroidery Floss**

I used these colors, you can use the same or choose your own: (the colors in the picture may be slightly different from the colors in real life due to the screen, brightness and other factors)





Stem: Stem Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss

Leaf: Lazy Daisy Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss



Flower Head: Wagon Wheel Rose stitch DMC 347 Salmon - VY DK 6 strands of floss

Stem: Stem Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss

Leaf: Lazy Daisy Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss



Flower Head: Wagon Wheel Rose Stitch DMC 3779 Terra Cotta - ULT VY LT 6 Strands of floss

Stem: Stem Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss

Leaf: Lazy Daisy Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss



Flower Head: Lazy Daisy Stitch DMC 3845 Bright Turquoise - MED 6 strands of floss

> Middle of flower French Knot Stitch DMC 725 Topaz 6 Strands of floss

Stem: Stem Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss

Leaf: Lazy Daisy Stitch DMC 472 Avocado Green ULT LT 6 Strands of floss



Flower Heads: French Knot Stitch DMC 3835 Grape - MED 6 Strands of floss

Stem: Back Stitch DMC 420 Hazelnut brown - DK 6 Strands of floss

# **Completing the Pattern**

You can trace the pattern with a pencil, I prefer to use a disappearing marker as it saves the trouble of erasing the left over marks later.

You can choose which part of the pattern you want to complete first. I usually complete the stems first and then go in and complete the flower heads.

I almost usually always complete the french knots last.

# Threading the Needle

For this pattern, we will use all 6 strands of the embroidery floss. I like to use around 60cm or more of each floss.

While it's not best practice to double or triple knot the end of the floss, I like to. When finishing the stitch I also like to double and triple knot at the back to keep everything secure.

# **Setting the Hoop Up**

When setting up your hoop, you want the fabric nice and tight, almost like a drum. Cut the fabric around the hoop, leaving a couple of inches of fabric right around the outside of the hoop. We do this so we can glue the fabric down when we complete the backing, later on in this tutorial.

# **The Stitches**

This Pattern uses 5 different basic embroidery stitches. Below shows a step by step picture tutorial for each stitch.

>Back Stitch


The stitches we will be learning:

>Wagon Wheel Rose

>French Knot >Lazy Daisy


>Stem Stitch

## **Wagon Wheel Rose**




- 1: Bring the needle up from the back of the fabric directly in the middle of the circle pattern
- 2: Make a simple stitch marking each line (5 lines)
- **3:** Bring the needle up from the back of the fabric close to the centre
- 4: Weave the needle and floss over and under the stitched lines we made in step 2
- **5:** Repeat until the pattern is full
- **6:** To complete the rose, put the needle slightly under the rose and push the needle through to the back, tie off with a double knot.

## **French Knot Rose**




- **1.**Bring your needle up through the back of the fabric where you want the knot to go.
- 2. Wrap the embroidery floss around the needle 2 to 3 times.
- **3.**Push the needle back into the fabric in the same place or close to where we initially push the needle through the fabric from the back.
- **4.**Hold the embroidery floss gently whilst you pull the entire length of floss through.
- **5.**Double knot to tie the stitch off at the back

## **Lazy Daisy Stitch**




## **Stem Stitch**



- 1.Bring the needle up from the back of the fabric where you want the stem to start.
- 2. Make a simple stitch. Keep it small, but not too small
- **3.** Bring the needle up from the back again, but this time leave a gap between the needle and your last stitch. This gap should be about the same size as your original stitch
- **4.** Take your needle back to your previous stitch. With your needle lift up stitch slightly and push the needle through close to the middle of the previous stitch.
- **5**.Repeat until the stem is complete and tie off at the back with a double knot.

## **Back Stitch**



- 1.Bring the needle up from the back of the fabric where you want the stem to start.
- 2. Make a simple stitch. Keep it small, but not too small
- **3.** Bring the needle up from the back again, but this time leave a gap between the needle and your last stitch. This gap should be about the same size as your original stitch
- **4.** Bring the needle down to your previous stitch. Push the needle through the hole at the end of your previous stitch.
- **5.** Repeat until the stitch is complete and tie off with a double knot at the back.

# **How to Finish the back (Optional)**

Finishing the back basically means to cover the back and tuck away any sticking out fabric from the sides of the hoop so it looks tidy when you showcase it on your wall.

#### Step 1:

Remover finished embroidery from hoop

#### Step 2

To the back of the embroidery fabric add your choice of backing fabric. The fabric should sit with the wrong sides together. If the fabric is see through you can double layer it or triple layer. You could also put a piece of felt in between.

#### Step 3.

Put your work back into the hoop

## Step 4

Cut around the hoop, leave enough fabric to be able to wrap the fabric around to the back.

## Step 5:

Tuck the fabric in the behind of the frame. You can tuck and glue it on the side and a little bit under the inside of the embroidery hoop.

## Step 6:

Cut away any excess fabric if there is any.
